Adjustment of status applications, visa renewals, waivers, and petitions affected by backlogs often remain unresolved well into the new year. This overlap creates risk. A case that feels close to approval may still be legally fragile, and leaving the United States at the wrong time can have lasting consequences.

Even short trips can lead to serious consequences if timing, paperwork, or immigration status is misunderstood. As families plan for 2026, it is worth slowing down and confirming whether travel is truly safe before making arrangements.

Who Should Pause International Travel?

Many families can travel safely with the right timing and preparation. In some situations, however, waiting a little longer is the best way to protect the progress already made in an immigration case. International travel should be carefully reviewed for individuals who have:

- **A Pending Adjustment Of Status Application:** Travel without proper authorization can jeopardize or abandon the case.
- **Prior Overstays Or Unresolved Immigration Issues:** Past problems can resurface during reentry screening.
- **A History Of Removal Proceedings Or Orders:** Travel may trigger renewed enforcement or scrutiny.
- **Criminal Charges or Convictions With Immigration Consequences:** Some offenses create reentry risks that may not be immediately obvious.
- **Lawful Permanent Residence With Extended Time Abroad:** Long absences can raise abandonment concerns.
- **Questions About Continuous Residence or Eligibility:** Even valid documents may not tell the full story.

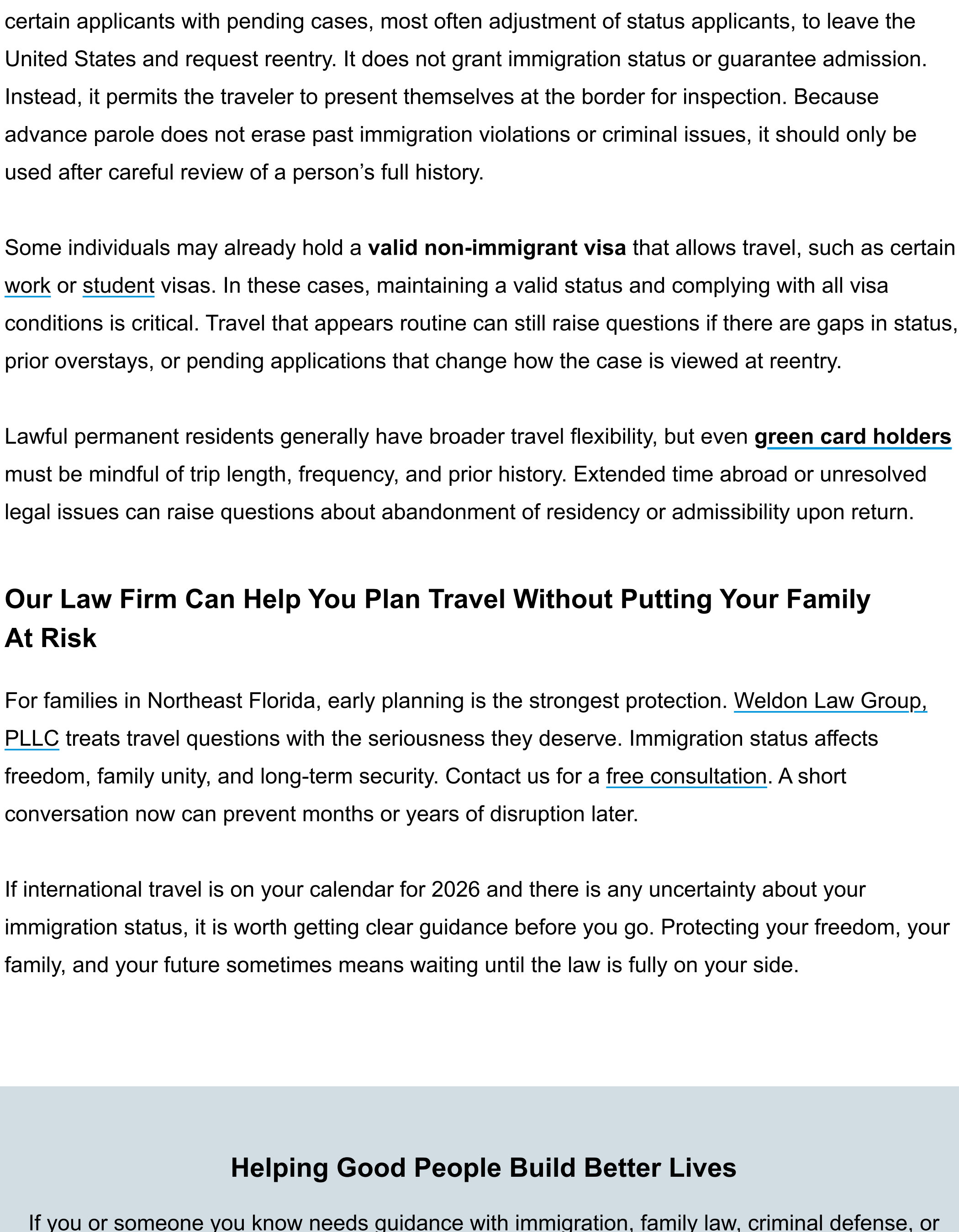

Reentry Risks For Pending Immigration Cases

One of the most common and costly misunderstandings involves pending cases. Many people assume that filing an application automatically protects them if they leave the country. That is often not the case.

Departing the United States while certain applications are pending can result in the case being treated as abandoned. In other situations, reentry may be denied based on issues that were never fully resolved when the application was filed. Border officers have broad discretion, and decisions are frequently made quickly, without the opportunity to clarify or correct misunderstandings.

Families are often surprised to learn that filing receipts, approval notices, or online status updates do not guarantee reentry.



Legal Options For International Travel During The Immigration Process

One common option is **advance parole**. Advance parole is a travel authorization that allows certain applicants with pending cases, most often adjustment of status applicants, to leave the United States and request reentry. It does not grant immigration status or guarantee admission. Instead, it permits the traveler to present themselves at the border for inspection. Because advance parole does not erase past immigration violations or criminal issues, it should only be used after careful review of a person's full history.

Some individuals may already hold a **valid non-immigrant visa** that allows travel, such as certain work or student visas. In these cases, maintaining a valid status and complying with all visa conditions is critical. Travel that appears routine can still raise questions if there are gaps in status, prior overstays, or pending applications that change how the case is viewed at reentry.

Lawful permanent residents generally have broader travel flexibility, but even **green card holders** must be mindful of trip length, frequency, and prior history. Extended time abroad or unresolved legal issues can raise questions about abandonment of residency or admissibility upon return.

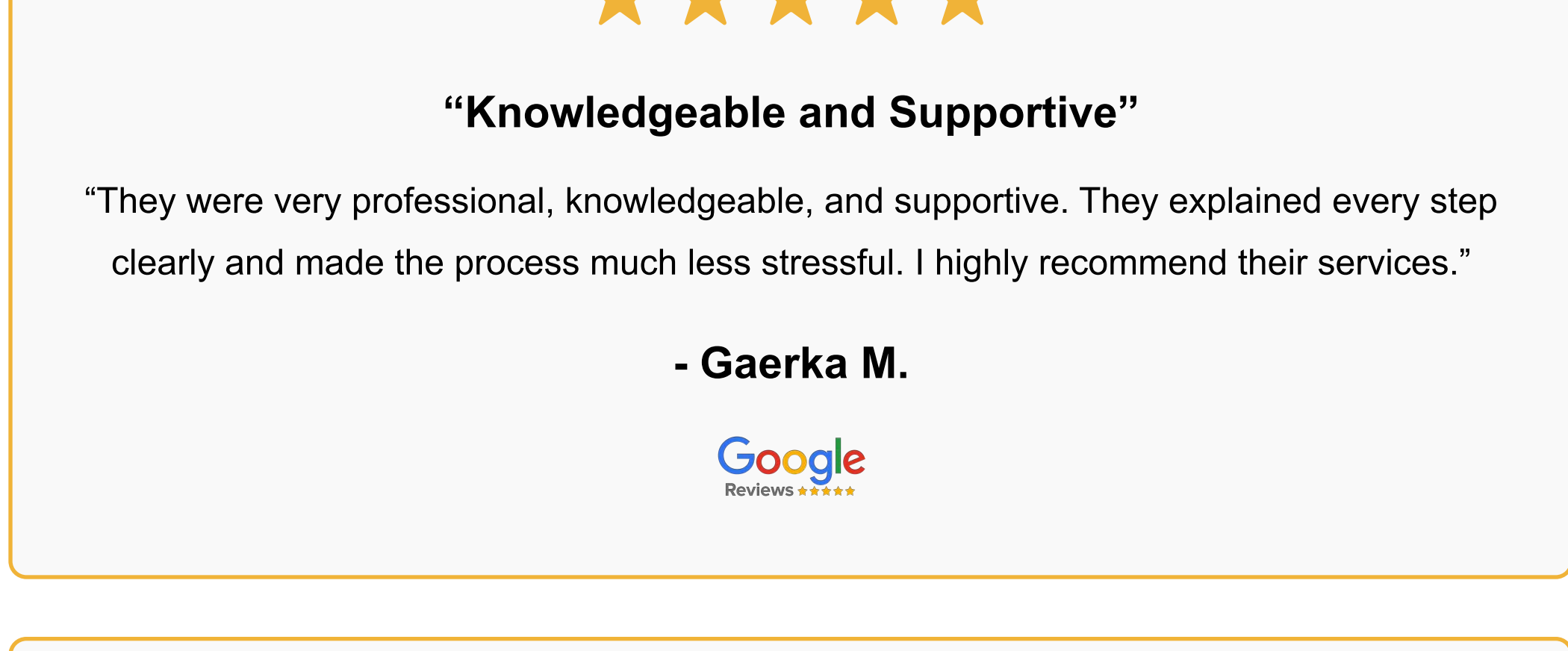
